## **ASH DIEBACK A MAJOR CONCERN**

Ash dieback has now been discovered in young ash plantations in counties Antrim, Down, Galway, Leitrim, Meath and Monaghan. This disease, which is caused by the fungus *Chalara fraxinea*, is a serious threat to ash.

Ash dieback has the potential to wipe out our ash trees in hedgerows, forests and parklands. Given the enormity of the threat, Ireland needs a national campaign to minimise the risk of this deadly disease. The Forest Service has destroyed all infected plants and imported stock that were part of the infected batch.

The Forest Service has also put legislation in place to ensure that ash plants are now imported only from areas, which are known to be free of the disease. Similar legislation is in place for the importation of ash timber,

which can be imported only in plank form without bark and with a moisture content below 20%. In addition, there continues to be excellent co-operation between the Departments of Agriculture, north and south.

Combating the threat posed by ash dieback will require a major campaign by the Forest Service in partnership with the public but especially key stakeholders including nurseries, woodland owners, farmers with plantations and ash in hedgerows, and parkland managers with specimen ash trees. The rapid spread of the disease in Britain suggests that the British Government and the various State agencies have not been able to contain the disease. To avoid dieback spread in Ireland, an aggressive approach at government level is required if we are to have any chance of controlling this disease.

I wish all members and their families a very Happy Christmas and every best wish for 2013.



### Honorary membership awarded to Dr. Jack Durand



Honorary membership was recently awarded to Dr. Jack Durand for his services to Irish forestry and the Society of Irish Foresters during the course of a distinguished career, which has continued long after he officially retired from the Forest Service. Not many know that Jack began his career as an engineer but transferred to forestry to play a major role in developing Ireland's open forest policy. His groundbreaking PhD thesis The Evolution of State Forestry in Ireland influenced forest policy in Ireland. His visionary work was recalled by John Mc Loughlin, President of the Society, when he proposed the motion to award honorary membership to Jack and Donal Magner who seconded the motion. Jack recently presented all his copies of Irish Forestry, the Society's journal to the University of Limerick. While the journal is now available in digitised format, third level colleges and other institutes always welcome the opportunity to have the original hard copies in their collections. Gobnait O'Riordan, Director of Library and Information Services at the University of Limerick was delighted to receive all copies of the journal dating back to the first edition published in 1943, from Jack. Also in attendance were: Pat O'Sullivan, John Mc Loughlin and George Cunningham, University of Limerick.

# Historic forestry journals preserved

Shane McEntee, Minister of State with responsibility for forestry launched the newly preserved and digitised Irish Forestry journals on June 25. He commended the Society of Irish Foresters for this initiative, which marks its 70th anniversary. "The Society is committed to making this important store of forestry knowledge more accessible to a wider audience of students, researchers and the general public," said John Mc Loughlin, President of the Society.

Minister McEntee congratulated the Society "on its proactive approach and foresight by

utilising technology to secure and ensure online access to these national forestry archives".

Over one hundred newly scanned and digitised journals are posted on the Society's website: www.societyofirishforesters.ie. These journals are now available to download free of charge and can be searched under date, topic or author. The scanning project, part funded by the Forest Service, was carried out by Datagroup, a social enterprise division of Innovation Wexford.

# **2012 Study Tour to Estonia**

This year's tour visited Estonia - a small, sparsely populated country which has a forested area of 2.24 million ha (51% of the land area) and an annual harvest of almost 8 million m3. Beginning in Tallinn, with an introductory lecture on Estonian forestry, the tour headed south to the university city of Tartu, stopping at several well managed forests en route. The tour also visited a variety of wood using industries, from the giant UPM-Kymmene owned plywood mill near Otepää to the Strauss family's small, wood-craft "factory" at Avinurme which relies on traditional wood working skills to produce an astonishing range of wooden toys, kitchen utensils and small furniture for export. In summary, it was a memorable tour. We are deeply indebted to the hard working staff at Fest-Forest who organised, guided and educated us during our short visit to their beautiful country.



# Budget proposal from IFFPA to Minister McEntee

AIFC — the forestry consultants' arm of the Society — has been at the core of developing forestry policy in Ireland through its work with the Irish Forestry and Forest Product Association (IFFPA). Sean Lenihan and Daragh Little of AIFC along with Trevor McHugh recently made a budget submission to Shane McEntee, Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, which covers a number of key proposals including afforestation, premium payments, investment in infrastructure (especially in roads), broadleaf thinning and woodland improvement.

"As a nation we are in the process of creating a world class forestry and timber sector populated by highly motivated entrepreneurs, working in sectors ranging from technology to timber processing, who see the true potential of Irish forestry," said Sean. "It is imperative at this time that the government continues to support this sector allowing it to fulfil its potential and promise for the Irish economy."

### Northern Ireland students dominate wood awards



For several years now the Wood Marketing Federation (WMF) has been promoting greater use and awareness of wood, especially in third level colleges, with its annual Third Level Student Wood Awards. As a result, there has been a significant increase in the curriculum content and time devoted to the study of timber in our universities and institutes of technology. In recent years the Society has supported this initiative that encourages students of architecture, engineering and design to use home-grown timber.

The 2012 awards were presented by Shane McEntee, Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine. Once again, Northern Ireland colleges dominated the awards. University of Ulster and Queen's University Belfast won the top architecture and engineering prizes while the award for best design project went west, to Letterfrack College in Galway-Mayo Institute of Technology.

Fergal Rainey, University of Ulster (UU) won the Architecture Award for his project entitled 'Making Space, Werburgh Street'. He designed a house and workshop for a guitar maker and his family in Werburgh Street, Dublin. The key to the project was the student's response to the existing buildings and his sensitive selection of building materials. He chose Dublin calp limestone and Irish grown spruce to ensure that the building is compatible with the existing streetscape. The Queen's University project presented by Connor O'Higgins involved the construction of a flexible dome, which has commercial potential. The winning design student, Craig Cox of Galway-Mayo Institute of Technology produced a video booth, incorporating reconstituted wood such as MDF, for recording "special moments at weddings and parties".

## In the Service of the State by Tom Briody

Tom Briody sadly passed away on November 24 in his 100th year, a few weeks after his second volume of memoirs was published. *In the Service of the State* is the follow up to The Road to Avondale which was an account of his early life. True to his promise at the end of the first volume he has delivered "an account of my life with Nora and my years as a forester in the service of the State and our struggle together to cope against the odds and to win through".

This volume begins 70 years ago in the early 1940s. By then Tom was an experienced and highly regarded forester. He was a founder member of the Society of Irish Foresters in 1942. His role in this key event was acknowledged when the President of the Society presented him with a specially minted medal at the book launch. Tom was also an Honorary Member of the Society.

Tom has managed to interweave the various strands of his

life – family, the role of the forester along with social and political aspects – that provide a fascinating glimpse of a time now almost unrecognisable. While his life as a forester dominates much of the book, it is all the better for his generous account of how Nora, his wife, coped with transfers and living conditions. His family were uprooted at short notice and transferred across the country, to all four provinces.

In the Service of the State will be read with relish by foresters, but it deserves a much wider audience as it is also a social history which is well told with passion and humour. His son Micheál also deserves credit for making recordings of Tom's life and editing the book. Micheál, a lecture in folklore in Helsinki University also benefited from the project. He discusses how he drew from his father's life and advice in writing his own tome The Irish Folklore Commission 1935-1970 published in 2007.

This book is also relevant to our times, especially now when a proposal to sell our State forests is being discussed. Decision makers would do well to read how this great resource was created and nurtured in more difficult times and they too might do well to consider their own roles *In the Service of the State*.
